INSPIRING

In July, an interpreter called to speak to our team because she has interpreted for PANSC patients in the past and recently worked with an uninsured patient, Carlos. The interpreter wanted to know more about Project Access to see if he could potentially qualify, then share'd Carlos's situation. Carlos's family has housing instability. He worked in construction prior to becoming sick and having to stop working. Carlos's wife does work some, but she is limited as she has to be very attentive to his care. He has help to keep his family in housing, and his care coordinator is connecting him with grocery resources for cancer patients, which will also help his family. Carlos has chemo every three weeks with multiple injections, and imaging in between his treatments. He is working very closely with his volunteer physician because of adverse reactions to his chemo. As of the last scan, he wasn't progressing well.

His physician asked for a second opinion, and Carlos is now working with his care team to explore the possibility of a new, more expensive treatment. He was concerned PANSC would deny him this new treatment, but his care coordinator explained how his care team proceeds is up to his doctors and their practice, and they want what his care team feels is best for him. Carlos and his family now have an apartment and his wife has a part-time job. Treatment will be a long road for Carlos and his family given his diagnosis and how it has progressed so far, but PANSC, his interpreter, and his physicians are walking through this journey with him, providing support and resources to support Carlos and his household as he pursues improved health.



2009: Bridges to Care Plus surpassed the \$10 million mark in donated specialty care for uninsured patients in Davidson County.

2015: PANSC celebrates 10 years and surpasses \$33 million in donated specialty care and continued growing partnerships in the community.

2020: MFN celebrates the 15 year mark of Project Access Nashville Specialty Care and ramps up expansion into the Middle Tennessee region.





*the value of donated medical care to our patients since 2005






